


Judith Anderson

Judith M. Anderson, Actor, February 10, 1897 - January 3, 1992

She is remembered as one of the great character actresses of her time particularly in powerful and tragic roles. When she became a Hollywood movie star in the 1940's she was already regarded as one of the greatest stage actresses of the era after a glittering career in theatre. She also made a triumphant transition into television acting later in her career.

She enjoyed a long career of seventy years, during which she received many honors. As well as two Emmy Awards and a Tony Award she was also nominated for a Grammy Award and a Best Supporting Actress Academy Award for her role in 'Rebecca' in 1940. In 1960 she was created a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire (DBE) and was often billed as "Dame Judith Anderson" and in June 1991, in the Queen's Birthday Honours, she was named a Companion in the Order of Australia (AC), "in recognition of service to the performing arts"




Jim Bailey

James William Bailey was an American singer, film, television and stage actor, and female impersonator.




Mr. Blackwell

Richard Blackwell, Fashion Critic, August 29, 1922 – October 19, 2008

Richard Blackwell was an American fashion critic, journalist, television and radio personality, artist, former child actor and former fashion designer, sometimes known just as Mr. Blackwell. He was the creator of the "Ten Worst Dressed Women List", an annual awards presentation he unveiled in January of each year.




Dirk Bogarde

Dirk Bogarde, Actor, March 28, 1921 – May 8, 1999

Sir Dirk Bogarde, original name Derek Niven van den Bogaerde, English actor who was one of Great Britain's most popular leading men in the 1950s. Bogarde was the son of a Dutch-born art critic. He made his stage debut in 1939 and won a film contract from the Rank studios after World War II. He gained attention for his role in the light comedy Doctor in the House (1954) and its sequels, but he later excelled in darker, more complex character roles, such as the blackmailed gay lawyer in Victim (1961), the sinister manservant in The Servant (1963), and the doomed Gustav von Aschenbach in Death in Venice (1971). Among his other films are Darling (1965), The


Fixer (1968), The Night Porter (1974), and Providence (1977). Beginning in 1977, Bogarde published a series of well-received memoirs, as well as novels and book reviews. He was knighted in 1992.



Rory Calhoun, Actor, August 8, 1922 – April 28, 1999

Rory Calhoun was an American film and television actor, screenwriter and producer. He starred in numerous Westerns in the 1950s and 1960s and appeared in supporting roles in films such as How to Marry a Millionaire.




Truman Capote, Author, September 30, 1924 – August 25, 1984

Truman Garcia Capote was an American novelist, short story writer, screenwriter, playwright, and actor. Several of his short stories, novels, and plays have been praised as literary classics, including the novella Breakfast at Tiffany's and the true crime novel In Cold Blood, which he labeled a "nonfiction novel."





Claudette Colbert was an American stage and film actress. Colbert began her career in Broadway productions during the late 1920s and progressed to motion pictures with the advent of talking pictures. Initially associated with Paramount Pictures, she gradually shifted to working as a freelance actress.



George Dewey Cukor was an American film director. He mainly concentrated on comedies and literary adaptations. George Cukor is the third-oldest winner for the Best Director Academy Award (won for "My Fair Lady" at age 65 years, 272 days).


James Dean

James Dean, Actor, February 8, 1931 – September 30, 1955

James Byron Dean was an American actor from Indiana. He is remembered as a cultural icon of teenage disillusionment and social estrangement, as expressed in the title of his most celebrated film, *Rebel Without a Cause*, in which he starred as troubled teenager, Jim Stark.

If a man can bridge the gap between life and death, if he can live on after he's dead, then maybe he was a great man.




Sandy Dennis

Sandy Dennis, Actor, April 27, 1937 – March 2, 1992

Sandra Dale Dennis was an American theater and film actress. At the height of her career in the 1960s she won two Tony Awards, as well as an Oscar for her performance in *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?*. Dennis was a well-renowned animal activist. She rescued stray cats from the bowels of Grand Central Terminal.



Charles Farrell

Charlie Farrell, Actor, Palm Springs Mayor, August 9, 1900 – May 6, 1990

Charles Farrell, an American film actor of the 1920's silent era and into the 1930's, and later a television actor. Farrell is probably best recalled for his onscreen romances with actress Janet Gaynor in more than a dozen films, including *7th Heaven*, *Street Angel*, and *Lucky Star*, and on TV in the sitcom *My Little Margie* (1952–55), playing Vern Albright, long-suffering father of the title character (played by Gale Storm).



Greta Garbo

Greta Garbo, Actor, September 18, 1905 – April 15, 1990


Greta Garbo was a Swedish-American film actress during the 1920s and 1930s. Garbo was nominated three times for the Academy Award for Best Actress and received an Academy Honorary Award in 1954 for her luminous and unforgettable screen performances.



Janet Gaynor

Janet Gaynor, Actor, October 6, 1906 – September 14, 1984

Janet Gaynor was an American film, stage and television actress and painter. Gaynor began her career as an extra in shorts and silent films. After signing with Fox Film Corporation in 1926, she rose to fame and became one of the biggest box office draws of the era.




Farley Granger, Actor, July 1, 1925 – March 27, 2011

Farley Earle Granger Jr. was an American actor, best known for his two collaborations with director Alfred Hitchcock: *Rope* in 1948 and *Strangers on a Train* in 1951.

Cary Grant, Actor, January 18, 1904 – November 29, 1986


Cary Grant was an English-born American actor, known as one of classic Hollywood's definitive leading men. He was known for his transatlantic accent, debonair demeanor, light-hearted approach to acting, and sense of comic timing. Grant was born in Horfield, Bristol.



Merv Griffin, TV Host, Musician, Actor, Media Mogul, July 6, 1925 – August 12, 2007

Mervyn Edward Griffin Jr. was an American television host and media mogul. He began his career as a radio and big band singer who went on to appear in film and on Broadway. From 1965 to 1986, Griffin hosted his own talk show, *The Merv Griffin Show*.




Moss Hart, Playwright, Theatre Director, October 24, 1904 – December 20, 1961



Edith Head, Costume Designer, October 28, 1897 – October 24, 1981


Edith Head was an American costume designer who won a record eight Academy Awards for Best Costume Design, starting with *The Heiress* and ending with *The Sting*. Born and raised in California, Head managed to get a job as a costume sketch artist at Paramount Pictures, without any relevant training.


Katharine Hepburn, Actor, May 12, 1907 – June 29, 2003

Katharine Houghton Hepburn was an American actress known for her fierce independence and spirited personality, who was a leading lady in Hollywood for more than 60 years. Katharine Hepburn ranks first among actors by total Academy Awards won (4) in acting categories.




Jerry Herman, Composer, Lyricist, July 10, 1931

Jerry Herman (born July 10, 1931) is an American composer and lyricist, known for his work in Broadway musical theater. He composed the scores for the hit Broadway musicals *Hello, Dolly!*, *Mame*, and *La Cage aux Folles*. He has been nominated for the Tony Award five times, and won twice, for *Hello, Dolly!* and *La Cage aux Folles*. In 2009, Herman received the Tony Award for Lifetime Achievement in the Theatre. He is a recipient of the 2010 Kennedy Center Honors.



Rock Hudson, Actor, November 17, 1925 – October 2, 1985

Rock Hudson, nee Roy Harold Scherer, Jr., was an American actor, generally known for his turns as a leading man during the 1950s and 1960s. His size and good looks got him into movies. In 1956 he received an Oscar nomination for *Giant* (1956) and two years later *Look* magazine named him Star of the Year. He starred in a number of bedroom comedies, many with Doris Day, and had his own popular TV series *McMillan & Wife* (1971-1977). He had a recurring role in TV's *Dynasty* (1981) (1984-1985). He was the first major public figure to announce he had AIDS, and his worldwide search for a cure drew international attention.




Tab Hunter, Actor, Singer, Film Producer, Author, July 11, 1931 – July 8, 2018

Tab Hunter was an American actor, singer, film producer and author. He appeared in over 40 films and was a well-known Hollywood star and heartthrob of the 1950s and 1960s, known for his blond, clean-cut good looks.

Danny Kaye, Actor, Singer, Dancer, Comedian, Philanthropist, January 18, 1911 – March 3, 1987

Danny Kaye was an American actor, singer, dancer, comedian, musician, and philanthropist. His performances featured physical comedy, idiosyncratic pantomimes, and rapid-fire novelty songs.

Patsy Kelly

Patsy Kelly, Actor, January 12, 1910 – September 24, 1981

Patsy Kelly was an American actress. She is known for her role as the brash, wisecracking sidekick to Thelma Todd in a series of short comedy films produced by Hal Roach in the 1930s. Known as the Queen of Wisecracks, Kelly's career continued after Todd's death in 1935 in similar roles.

Nancy Kulp

Nancy Kulp, Comedic Actor, August 28, 1921 – February 3, 1991

Nancy Jane Kulp was an American character actress best known as Miss Jane Hathaway on the CBS television series *The Beverly Hillbillies* (1962-1971).

In 1989, Kulp gave an interview to author and homosexual activist Boze Hadleigh in which she said, "As long as you reproduce my reply word for word, and the question, you may use it ... I'd appreciate it if you'd let me phrase the question. There is more than one way. Here's

how I would ask it: "Do you think that opposites attract?" My own reply would be that I'm the other sort — I find that birds of a feather flock together. That answers your question

Charles Laughton

Charles Laughton, Actor, July 1, 1899 – December 15, 1962

Charles Laughton was an English stage and film actor. Laughton was trained in London at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and first appeared professionally on the stage in 1926. In 1927, he was cast in a play with his future wife Elsa Lanchester, with whom he lived and worked until his death.

Liberace, Composer, Pianist, Singer, Actor, Entertainer, May 16, 1919 – February 4, 1987

Władziu Valentino Liberace was an American pianist, singer and actor. A child prodigy born in Wisconsin to parents of Italian and Polish origin, Liberace enjoyed a career spanning four decades of concerts, recordings, television, motion pictures, and endorsements.

Marjorie Main

Marjorie Main, Actor, February 24, 1890 – April 10, 1975

Marjorie Main was the stage name of Mary Tomlinson, who was an American character actress and singer of the Classical Hollywood period, best known as a Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer contract player in the 1940s and 1950s, and for her role as Ma Kettle in ten *Ma and Pa Kettle* movies.



Mary Martin

Mary Martin, Actor, December 1, 1913 – November 3, 1990

Mary Virginia Martin was an American actress, singer, and Broadway star. A muse of Rodgers and Hammerstein's, she originated many leading roles over her career including Nellie Forbush in South Pacific and Maria von Trapp in The Sound of Music. She was named a Kennedy Center Honoree in 1989. Children: Larry Hagman, Heller Halliday

Johnny Mercer

Johnny Mercer, Lyricist, Songwriter, Singer, November 18, 1909 – June 25, 1976

John Herndon Mercer was an American lyricist, songwriter, and singer. He was also a record label executive who co-founded Capitol Records with music industry businessman Buddy DeSylva and Glenn E. Wallichs. He is best known as a Tin Pan Alley lyricist, but he also composed music.

Sal Mineo

Sal Mineo, Actor, January 10, 1939 – February 12, 1976

Salvatore Mineo Jr. was an American film and theatre actor and director. Mineo is chiefly known for his performance as John "Plato" Crawford opposite James Dean in the film Rebel Without a Cause. He was nominated for Best Supporting Actor for his performance in this film and again for his role as Dov Landau in Exodus (1960).


Expanding his repertoire, Mineo returned to the theatre to direct and star in the play "Fortune and Men's Eyes" with successful runs in both New York and Los Angeles. In the late 1960s and 1970s he continued to work steadily in supporting roles on TV and in film, including Dr. Milo in Escape from the Planet of the Apes (1971) and Harry O (1973). In 1975 he returned to the stage in the San Francisco hit production of "P.S. Your Cat Is Dead". Preparing to open the play in Los Angeles in 1976 with Keir Dullea, he returned home from rehearsal the evening of February 12th when he was attacked and stabbed to death by a stranger.



Agnes Moorehead

Agnes Moorehead, Actor, December 6, 1900 – April 30, 1974


Agnes Robertson Moorehead was an American actress whose 41-year career included work in radio, stage, film, and television. Agnes Moorehead has been immortalized as Elizabeth Montgomery's flamboyant witch-mother, Endora, though that was not a role the actress wished to be remembered for, in spite of several Emmy Award nominations.



George Nader


George Nader, Actor, October 19, 1921 – February 4, 2002

George Nader was an American film and television actor. He appeared in a variety of films from 1950 through 1974, including Sins of Jezebel, Congo Crossing, and The Female Animal. During this period, he also did episodic television and starred in several series, including NBC's The Man and the Challenge.



Ramon Novarro, Actor, February 6, 1899 – October 30, 1968

Jose Ramón Gil Samaniego, known professionally as Ramón Novarro, was a Mexican-born United States film, stage and television actor who began his career in silent films in 1917 and eventually became a leading man and one of the top box office attractions of the 1920s and early 1930s. Sadly, he was murdered on October 30, 1968, Laurel Canyon, Los Angeles, CA.




Laurence Olivier, Actor, Director, May 22, 1907 – July 11, 1989

Laurence Kerr Olivier, Baron Olivier, OM was an English actor and director who, along with his contemporaries Ralph Richardson, Peggy Ashcroft and John Gielgud, dominated the British stage of the mid-20th century. He also worked in films throughout his career, playing more than fifty cinema roles. Laurence Olivier has the fourth-most Academy Award nominations (10) in four acting categories of all time.


Anthony Perkins, Actor, April 4, 1932 – September 12, 1992

Anthony Perkins was an American actor and singer. He was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Supporting Actor for his second film, *Friendly Persuasion*, but is best remembered for playing Norman Bates in Alfred Hitchcock's *Psycho* and its three sequels.

Perkins was an extremely shy person, especially in the company of women. According to the posthumous biography *Split Image* by Charles Winecoff, he had exclusively same-sex relationships until his late 30s, including with actor Tab Hunter; artist Christopher Makos;


dancer Rudolf Nureyev; composer/lyricist Stephen Sondheim; and dancer-choreographer Grover Dale. Perkins has been described as one of the two great men in the life of French songwriter Patrick Loiseau.

Diagnosed with HIV during the filming of *Psycho IV: The Beginning*, Perkins died at his Los Angeles home on September 12, 1992, from AIDS-related pneumonia at age 60. His urn is inscribed "Don't Fence Me In".



Cole Porter, Composer, Songwriter, June 9, 1891 – October 15, 1964

Cole Albert Porter was an American composer and songwriter. Many of his songs became standards noted for their witty, urbane lyrics, and many of his scores found success on Broadway and in film. Born to a wealthy family in Indiana, Porter defied his grandfather's wishes and took up music as a profession.




Tyrone Power

Tyrone Power, Actor, May 5, 1914 – November 15, 1958

Tyrone Edmund Power III was an American film, stage and radio actor. From the 1930s to the 1950s, Power appeared in dozens of films, often in swashbuckler roles or romantic leads. He was one of the top leading men of Hollywood's golden era. He became an overnight star and leading man at the age of twenty-two and made about fifty films in a career that was cut short by a heart attack at the age of forty-four. On May 31, 1937, just six months after his breakout role in Lloyd's of London, his hands and feet were placed in cement at Grauman's Chinese Theater.


For three straight years - 1939 through 1941, Ty was named "King of the Movies" by fans. Some critics of the day viewed his huge box-office appeal as being largely due to his extraordinary good looks, but many today say that he was quite a good actor, one of the most underrated of his era.



Vincent Price

Vincent Price, Actor, May 27, 1911 – October 25, 1993

Vincent Leonard Price Jr. was an American actor best known for his performances in horror films, although his career spanned other genres, including film noir, drama, mystery, thriller, and comedy. He appeared on stage, television, and radio, and in more than 100 films. His TV performances included Columbo, The 13 Ghosts of Scooby-Doo, Batman, and many others.



Cesar Romero

Cesar Romero, Actor, Singer, Dancer, Vocal Artist, February 15, 1907 – January 1, 1994

Tall, suave and sophisticated Cesar Romero actually had two claims to fame in Hollywood. To one generation, he was the distinguished Latin lover of numerous musicals and romantic comedies, and the rogue bandit The Cisco Kid in a string of low-budget westerns. However, to a younger generation weaned on television, Romero was better known as the white-faced, green-haired, cackling villain The Joker of the camp 1960s TV series Batman (1966-1968), and as a bumbling corporate villain in a spate of Walt Disney comedies, such as chasing a young Kurt


Russell in the fun-packed The Computer Wore Tennis Shoes (1969). Fans and critics alike agreed that Romero was a major talent who proved himself an enduring and versatile star in an overwhelming variety of roles in a career as an actor, dancer and comedian that lasted nearly 60 years.



José Sarria


Jose' Sarria, Political Activist, Empress of the Imperial Court, Entertainer, December 13, 1922 – August 19, 2013

José Julio Sarria also known as The Grand Mere, Absolute Empress I de San Francisco, and the Widow Norton was an American political activist from San Francisco, California, who in 1961 became the first openly gay candidate for public office in the United States, (San Diego, CA). Jose' founded the Imperial Court System and the Tavern Guild organizations.



John Schlesinger, Actor, Director, February 16, 1926 – July 25, 2003


Born John Richard Schlesinger, in London, England. Known for such films as *Midnight Cowboy*, *Sunday, Bloody Sunday*, and *Darling*, Schlesinger was a brave, honest, and sometimes controversial director who won an Oscar for *Midnight Cowboy* (the only X-rated film to win Best Picture) and was nominated for several other awards throughout his career. He started out as an actor, before he found his place in the world of directing where "his stylish, groundbreaking films will be remembered for their riveting displays of all-too-human emotions," *Newsweek* wrote.



Randolph Scott, Actor, January 23, 1898 – March 2, 1987


George Randolph Scott was an American film actor whose career spanned the years from 1928 to 1962. As a leading man for all but the first three years of his cinematic career, Scott appeared in a variety of genres, including social dramas, crime dramas, comedies, musicals (albeit in non-singing and non-dancing roles), adventure tales, war films, and a few horror and fantasy films. However, his most enduring image is that of the tall-in-the-saddle Western hero. Out of his more than 100 film appearances over 60 were in Westerns; thus, "of all the major stars whose name was associated with the Western, Scott most closely identified with it."

Although Scott achieved fame as a motion picture actor, he managed to keep a fairly low profile with his private life. Offscreen he was a good friend of Fred Astaire and Cary Grant. He met Grant on the set of *Hot Saturday* (1932), and shortly afterwards, to save on living expenses, they shared a beach house for 12 years in Malibu that became known as "Bachelor Hall". In 1944, Scott and Grant stopped living together but remained close friends throughout their lives.



Spencer Tracy, Actor, April 5, 1900 – June 10, 1967

Spencer Bonaventure Tracy was an American actor, noted for his natural performing style and versatility. One of the major stars of Hollywood's Golden Age, Tracy won two Academy Awards for Best Actor from nine nominations, sharing the record for nominations in the category with Laurence Olivier. Spencer Tracy ranks seventh among actors / actresses by total Academy Awards won (2) in acting categories.




Adam West, Actor, September 19, 1928 – June 9, 2017

William West Anderson, known professionally as Adam West, was an American actor, known primarily for his role as Batman in the 1960s ABC series of the same name and its 1966 theatrical feature film. West began acting in films in the 1950s. He played opposite Chuck Connors in *Geronimo* (1962) and *The Three Stooges* in *The Outlaws Is Coming* (1965). He also appeared in the science fiction film *Robinson Crusoe on Mars* (1964) and performed voice work on *The Fairly OddParents* (2003–2008), *The Simpsons* (1992, 2002), and *Family Guy* (2000–2019), playing fictional versions of himself in

all three. Late in his career, West starred in two direct-to-video animated Batman films, *Batman: Return of the Caped Crusaders*, and *Batman vs. Two-Face*, the latter of which was released posthumously.



James Whale, Director, July 22, 1889 – May 29, 1957



James Whale was an English film director, theater director and actor, who spent the greater part of his career in Hollywood. He is best remembered for several horror films: *Frankenstein*, *The Old Dark House*, *The Invisible Man* and *Bride of Frankenstein*, all considered classics.
